A School Travel Plan (STP) is a simple written document that identifies local issues relating to the school journey, sets out a strategy of agreed aims and identifies a package of measures designed to promote more sustainable travel choices for pupils, parents/carers, staff and visitors to your school. Where are we now?

Based on data gathered between the 11th and 22nd March through the Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel 2024 our daily average score of those **walking or wheeling to school was 59.59%** of the school roll from P1-P7.

58% of our P6 learners in 23-24 session achieved Bikeability Level 2.

63% of our P5 learners in 23-24 session achieved Bikeability Level 1.

13 children were injured on Aberdeen's roads in 2022. Two thirds of child casualties over the last 10 years were pedestrians and 87% of this occurred around school travel time. (*Aberdeen City Council Road Safety Plan, 2023*)

28% of children killed or injured on Scotland's roads happens in two time periods 8 am – 9 am and 3 pm – 4 pm. 28% in two hours. (*Transport Scotland 2018-23*)

65% of Aberdeen's primary school children walked to school in 2008. In 2022, only 54% walked. (Sustrans Hands Up survey, 2023)

Less than 5% of primary school children cycle to school (Sustrans, Hands Up survey, 2023)

Parking during drop off and pick up remains a safety issue for all stakeholders, predominantly the learners. A site visit was conducted by a Technical Officer from Aberdeen City Council following concerns relating to indiscriminate parking in and around Cults Primary School. They noted that after carrying out a site visit the scale of the problem was apparent. This site visit was conducted at both start and at the end of a school day. It was noted that there are a large number of parents driving their children to and from school creating considerable congestion in and around the roads adjacent to the school and although the school ring road affords parking for parents waiting for their children, there was still a considerable amount of parents parking and waiting on the regulated waiting restrictions, in some instances at extremely dangerous locations. The signing and lining have been assessed around the school and have been deemed adequate and therefore it was felt that the traffic management team has maximised the provision of waiting restrictions without having a detrimental effect on the local residents. They suggested that this problem seems to be an educational issue with the parents themselves ignoring these regulated markings as if they do not apply to them and that parents should take some responsibility, as it is vital that they appreciate the dangers their actions have to the road safety of their children at the school, especially at school pick-up and drop off times.


What do we want to change?

Reduce the volume of vehicles on the school run.
